### A Message from our Principal

Kia ora e te whānau,

Our staff have been very busy this term preparing the senior school for their final assessments and writing reports for our junior school. Junior pupils will receive a full written report at the end of the term. Please put in your diary the junior prizegiving awards ceremony on Wednesday the 4th of December at 11:00am.

As the seniors are now sitting their external NCEA examinations, we expect our junior pupils to step up and lead our school. Our expectations and rules remain the same until the very last day of term on the 6th of December.

We have organised a variety of camps for different year levels, prioritising local options and keeping costs to a minimum. 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### Journey of the Te Manawa o Te Mātui Kapa Haka Group to Australia

#### Tuia te Manawanui, Tuia te Manawaroa, Tuia Te Manawa o Te Mātui e

We had the incredible opportunity to take the Te Manawa o Te Mātui Kapa Haka group on a cultural exchange trip to Australia. This journey was not just about performance; it was a profound experience that allowed our students to showcase Māori culture while learning from and connecting with the Aboriginal culture in Australia. The experience was enriching for the students, fostering a deeper understanding of cultural identity, respect, and appreciation.

The planning process for this trip involved months of preparation. We began by selecting a repertoire of performances that authentically represented our Māori culture, including traditional haka, waiata (songs), and storytelling. We emphasized the significance of each piece, ensuring the students understood the cultural narratives behind their performances.

We also organized cultural workshops to prepare the students not only for their performances but to engage meaningfully with the Aboriginal communities in Australia. This included learning about the importance of cultural exchange, respect for traditions, and the value of sharing stories through performance.

Upon arriving in Australia, the Te Manawa o Te Mātui group was greeted with warmth and enthusiasm. Our performance were held at community events that celebrated both Māori and Aboriginal cultures. The students performed with pride, showcasing their skills and sharing the beauty of Māori traditions with the audience.

The highlight of the event was the exchange of cultural practices. After our performance, we had the opportunity to watch Aboriginal dancers and musicians. This interaction was not only entertaining but also educational. Students learned about the similarities and differences in our cultures, particularly how both Māori and Aboriginal peoples use performance to convey stories, values, and histories.

This experience had a profound impact on our students. It boosted their confidence as performers and nurtured a sense of pride in their Māori heritage. Engaging with another culture allowed them to see their own traditions in a new light, reinforcing their understanding of the importance of cultural identity.

The students returned with a broader perspective on the world, an appreciation for diversity, and a commitment to sharing their culture with others.
